The Fair Education Alliance is a coalition of 250 of the UK's leading organisations from business, the third sector and education, all working towards a world where our education system is fair — where no child's educational success is limited by their socio-economic background. This is a world where disadvantage no longer determines literacy and numeracy rates at primary school, GCSE attainment at secondary school, the emotional wellbeing and resilience of young people, participation in further education or employment-based training, or university admissions.



The Problem

Education is not fair

Young people from low-income communities are much less likely to succeed in education

Progress is too slow

Progress in tackling educational inequality is too slow because work is fragmented and done in silos



Our vision and mission

Our vision is a country where no child's success is determined by their socioeconomic background.

No one organisation, sector or even government can fix these complex issues.

We need a new approach to tackle educational inequality collectively, and to work across sectors, organisations and individuals.



The case for change from young people

Supporting youth leadership is central to the work of the FEA and we are calling for a sector-wide shift in youth participation. Our youth steering group leads in bringing the perspective of young people to our work. Here's what young people had to say about why the sector should work with them as equal partners going forward:


Our 5 Impact Goals

- Impact Goal 1: Narrow the gap in literacy and numeracy at primary school
- Impact Goal 2: Narrow the gap in GCSE attainment at secondary school
- Impact Goal 3: Ensure young people develop social and emotional competencies, good mental health and wellbeing
- Impact Goal 4: Narrow the gap in the proportion of young people taking part in further education or training after finishing their GCSEs
- Impact Goal 5: Narrow the gap in university access





Collective Action



In order to create the inclusive education system that we want to see, we know that we cannot work in isolation. Therefore, we bring together members to take collective action.

We do this in the following ways:

- Capacity building support for member led collective action
- By joining up with others (Joining the dots), FED, Big Change, ASCL, Rethinking Assessment

Youth Engagement

Young people and staff from the FEA and our members co-facilitate sessions about different elements of youth engagement practice.



Literacy Advocacy

This group informs how we can advocate for a literacy system which benefits all young people, particularly the most disadvantaged. The group completed their manifesto and accompanying strategy document in Spring 2022.

Parental Engagement

<u>Learning with Parents</u> leads this group to drive forward a shared understanding across the sector of effective parental engagement and its pivotal role in addressing the attainment gap, and to transform parents' and carers' roles in education.



Wellbeing and Inclusion

Most recently, the group met to review the SEND and AP Green Paper and is likely to focus further on SEND in the coming months.

Tackling Racial Inequality

This group looks at equality, inclusion and diversity in education.

They convened school and third sector leaders to respond to <u>research</u> by NFER on racial inequality in the teaching workforce and shared their ideas with the APPG for the teaching profession.



Delivery

They meet to share best practice and support each other in working through challenges related to digital and in-person programmes with young people.

Tuition Advocacy

This group, led by <u>Action Tutoring</u> CEO Susannah Hardyman advocates the value of tuition in supporting schools and colleges, both in the context of the National Tutoring Programme (NTP) and the wider vision for tutoring in closing the gap. The group contributed to significant improvements to the NTP and provided expertise for member CfEY's report, 'Levelling Up Tutoring'.



Digital Tools

Our digital membership tools (launching Autumn 2022) support our members to target the areas of greatest need and **connect** and **collaborate** more effectively so that we **close the education gap** more quickly.

This **online**, secure platform will be **open to all staff** of all FEA members and includes the following:



Member directory – where members can find out information about other members - what do, where they work, who their beneficiaries are, etc



Collaborative workspace – where members can access support, ask questions, and share with fellow members, either 1:1 or in groups



Ecosystem map – where members can identify cold spots through data on education mapped against institutions where members work



Youth Engagement



Thanks to funding from The Pears #iwill Fund we were able to co-develop a Youth Engagement Strategy with young people and our members in 2021. It outlines two strands of work we see as critical to achieving the goal set by the young people that is essential to our overall aim that no child's success is limited by their socio-economic background.

Young people, including those who face barriers to accessing a fair education, are respected and heard in all decisions affecting their education.

Young People are involved as equal partners in the work of the Fair Education Alliance.

This includes:

- Establishing a Youth Steering Group
- Involving young people in our Collective Action & Policy Influencing
- Young people having leadership roles in our Communications, Events and Awards



2012

Teach First created the Impact Goals. Our founding members came together to agree five Fair Education Impact Goals. These are targets which, if achieved, will substantially reduce educational inequality. The goals follow the educational journey of a child from primary school through to higher education and employment (see p.8 for our Impact Goals).

2014

The FEA was launched to bring together the hundreds of committed organisations and individuals across education, policy, third sector and business who believed that by working together, learning from each other, sharing evidence and amplifying our efforts through our networks, we can drive change more quickly. **Annual report cards.** Every year since 2014, we published our annual state of the nation report card, measuring educational inequality and putting forward our recommendations to close the gaps between the most disadvantages children and their peers.

2015

The secretariat was born.

We had our first full-time staff member focused on connecting our growing membership and driving changes together.

We focused on our Impact Goals working groups. We pushed forward our recommendations and published influential reports on numeracy, wellbeing, and contextualised university admissions. These received widespread news and our membership swelled to over 100.

2018

Collective Action Priorities were jointly decided on by members at our Annual Summit.

2019

We merged with the Teach First Innovation Unit and launched three Scaling Impact Awards to nurture and scale impactful solutions. We also launched our 3 year strategy and produced our first Annual Report.

2021

2022 and beyond...

The changing social context around the FEA's work.
